Please come to the AGM and think about joining the Board. We need your ideas and energy. One or two of our Board members have told us they would like to retire and turn their duties over to someone else.


It's been a great summer, in spite of the smoke and the humidity. This is always a good place to be.

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

### **CLWA Members Labour Day Fishing Derby**



Friday Sept. 1st, 12 noon to Monday Sept. 4th, 6 p.m.

In this tournament there will be no weigh in or a need to keep the fish caught. Instead, the angler will take a picture of the fish against a ruler and a publication that shows the date. The picture will be submitted electronically to the CLWA website to be entered. Prizes will be awarded for the top 3 longest Bass, as well as 3 mystery length prizes. An entree must include the CLWA members name and address to be considered valid.



**CLWA FISHING DERBY RULES** 

- The tournament runs from Friday September 1st 12 Noon to Monday September 4th 6 pm.
- Bass (Rock, Smallmouth and Largemouth Bass) will be the only fish eligible. Live release is encouraged, MNRF keep rules apply.
- Open to CLWA members and their family and friends only. Participates must use their own name and a current CLWA members name and address to enter. Anyone may enter as long as they have permission from a current member. Winners will be named along with their CLWA sponsor.
- A picture of the fish, which shows the length against a ruler and also includes a print out of

a CLWA posted page OR a newspaper or other medium that proves the date. The posted printout or the newspaper will verify that the fish was caught during derby times. The posted page would be available to print on the CLWA website or from the CLWA Facebook page on Friday September 1st, at 12 Noon. The newspaper (or medium page) must show the publication date. One picture can be used as long as it shows the length and date. A picture of the entered fish and the angler is also required for our use in our publications. [Note: The picture below is an example only. It was used in 2022. A new picture will be used for 2023.]

The picture is then forwarded to info@clwa. ca and includes the name of the angler and their CLWA sponsor and address.

Prizes will be awarded for the top 3 lengths, \$100/first, \$75/second, \$50/third and 3 mystery lengths prizes of \$25 each. Prizes will be in the form of a cheque in the CLWA member's name and will be mailed or given to the CLWA member. There is no entry fee. The CLWA member must be in good standing. Anglers may have multiple entrees.

Winners will be posted on our Facebook page (Crowe Lake Waterway Association) and on the CLWA website (clwa.ca). By entering, you acknowledge your permission for CLWA to use your photos.

### Municipal Dog Licensing Policy, Released July 13, 2023

- 2.1 No person shall own a dog in the Municipality without a dog licence, whether the dog is spayed, neutered, and/or microchipped.
- 2.2 Every person who owns a dog in the Municipality, within seven days of acquiring the dog, will purchase a new licence and thus register the dog with the Municipality, and thereafter will, annually, on or before the 31st of March, pay to the Municipality, or its authorized agent, the associated licence fee, in accordance with Schedule "A" of this bylaw, and User Fee Bylaw No. 2023-25, as amended. Every licence will be issued with respect to a calendar year and will expire on December 31st of each year.
- 9.1 Dog owners who refuse to purchase the required dog licence will be subject to the related fine in Schedule "B" of this bylaw.

Dog tags cost \$25 from January-March and then go up to \$40 (due to a late fee). This year, the late fee didn't start until June 1st. All dog owners are expected to buy current tags at the beginning of each calendar year. Tags can be purchased at the Municipal Town Hall Office, at 12 Bursthall St., Marmora. Accepted payment methods include cash, cheque, and debit.

If you have questions, or feel you received a letter in error, please contact the Municipal Office at 613-472-2629.

Seasonal residents are responsible for registering their dogs with the Municipality, and purchasing a licence tag for each dog that they harbor while in the Municipality.

### **Protect Your ATVs And Snowmobiles From Theft**

Like other cottage toys, ATVs are highly mobile—and not just when you want them to be. In the swath of northwestern Alberta patrolled by the RCMP's Grande Prairie detachment, ATVs and snowmobiles are lifted from pickup trucks and trailers, stolen from locked garages, and rolled away from farms and cabins at the rate of about one a week, says Cpl. Roy Kennedy.

Kennedy suggests that owners insure and register their vehicle and keep it out of sight in a locked building. Installing a GPS tracking system and inscribing your name on a hidden spot for identification are both good ideas. If you leave your guad in a truck, limit access by parking against a building or another vehicle. Lock the tailgate, chain a wheel to one of the box's tie-downs, and take the keys with you.

At the cottage, try sticking an anchor point where the sun don't shine: when pouring concrete footings or slabs, set a galvanized U-bolt or eyebolt (with a nut and washer on the end) into wet concrete. If you're worried about tripping on the bolt, recess it into the concrete with a form made from a plastic cup.

Cottagers with plywood-floored sheds can follow Joe Vermaire's lead. The Barry's Bay, Ont., cottager drilled a hole through the floor and then crawled beneath to glue and screw two lengths of pressure-treated 2×6 below the hole. He drilled through the 2x6s and installed an eyebolt. Over winter, he also removes a wheel and takes it home. When thieves are confronted with this level of security, Vermaire's hoping they'll say, "Nuts to that."

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### Can You Recycle Used Pool Toys?

[Editor Note: Quinte West will not accept vinyl for recycling. It should be treated as garbage for disposal. The article has been edited but presented as good-to-know environmental protection information. The link for the entire article is at the end.]

Inflatable pool toys cannot be recycled. They're made of a type of PVC that is not easily reused, so they end up in landfills. Your best option is to try to seal any leaks in your existing pool toys and minimize purchasing new ones in the future.

This is because while inflatable pool toys are constructed from plastic, they are made from the only plastic that cannot be recycled; PVC. Now, technically, PVC can be recycled. However, we do not do it all that often. This is because of the way that PVC has been made. It's packed to the brim with all sorts of additives. To recycle PVC, all of these additives would need to be separated. This requires a lot of equipment and a lot of human resources. It is so expensive to recycle PVC that it is just cheaper to produce new PVC to keep up with its demand.

In most cases, you will have no choice but to put the inflatable pool toys into your regular garbage can. The problem? This is likely going to be ending up in a landfill. We want to reduce the amount of garbage that goes into landfills.

Once the PVC is in a landfill, these chemicals will be released into the environment. It will kill the land. It can get into the water supplies. Honestly, it is never going to be a good thing. Some places will burn their garbage to help prevent it from going into landfills. While this isn't the best idea because it can pollute the environment, it is the main option many places are now turning to. However, burning PVC is awful. It releases highly toxic chemicals. It isn't good for the planet.

The problem is that you have to dispose of the PVC inflatable pool toys this way. There are very few other methods that you can use to get rid of it. It is incredibly annoying. The only thing you can do is avoid

buying PVC products in the future. However, even this will be difficult since nearly every inflatable pool toy you can buy uses PVC in its construction.

There are a few steps you can take to dispose of inflatable pool toys properly:

- 1. Check with your local recycling center or waste management facility to see if they accept inflatable pool toys. Some facilities may have specific guidelines or requirements for how the toys should be prepared for recycling. [Quinte West does not accept vinyl for recycling but other recycling sites might.]
- 2. If your local recycling center does not accept inflatable pool toys, you may be able to donate them to a local community center, school, or charity.
- 3. If your inflatable pool toy is no longer usable, you can cut it up and put it in your household trash. Be sure to follow any local guidelines for disposing of household waste.
- 4. Consider reusing or repurposing the inflatable pool toy before disposing of it. For example, you could use it as a decoration or a makeshift obstacle course for kids.
- 5. Suppose you have a large number of inflatable pool toys that you need to dispose of. You may find a local business that recycles inflatable items in that case.
- 6. Finally, it's important to follow all local regulations and guidelines for disposing of inflatable pool toys. This can help to protect the environment and prevent unnecessary waste.

### **How Long Condiments Last**

Here's how long those condiments in your fridge and pantry are supposed to last. These guidelines have been pulled from the FoodKeeper database (also available as a phone app) at foodsafety.gov and this chart from the Kansas State University Cooperative Extension Service. Unless otherwise noted, each category includes how long the unopened product can be stored in your pantry unopened followed by suggested refrigeration time after opening.

Honey: Consume within 2 years (store in

pantry).

**Horseradish:** 12 months when stored in refrigerator; 3 to 4 months refrigerated after opening.

Jams, jellies and preserves: 6 to 18 months;

6 to 12 months.

Ketchup: 1 year; 6 months.

Maple syrup: Consume within 12 months if stored

in pantry, refrigeration will extend life. **Mayonnaise:** 3 to 6 months; 2 months.

Mustard: 1 to 2 years; 1 year

**Peanut butter:** 1 year when stored in refrigerator and 3 to 4 months refrigerated after opening (natural); 6 to 9 months when stored in pantry or 12 months stored in refrigerator, 2 to 3 months in pantry or 3 to 4 months refrigerated after opening (commercial, stabilized).

Pickles: 1 year; 1 to 3 months. Relish: 30 months; 9 months.

Salad dressing: 10 to 12 months; 1 to 3 months.

Salsa: 1 year; 1 month

Soy sauce or teriyaki sauce: 3 years; 1 month. **Vinegar:** Can last essentially indefinitely, though
KSU suggests 2 years in the pantry unopened and

1 year opened.

Worcestershire sauce: 1 year (unopened or

opened) in pantry.



### Places to Stop and Explore Along Highway 7

Highway 7 is one of Ontario's oldest highways, and before Highway 401 was built, it was the main thoroughfare that connected Toronto to Ottawa. Now, it cuts right through eastern Ontario's cottage country, winding around towns like Sharbot Lake, Kaladar, Madoc, and Peterborough. It's a popular route for cottagers or just about anyone looking to escape for a weekend. That's why we've compiled a list of nine stops along Highway 7. Whether it's for food, fun, or just to stretch your legs, add these places to your list and experience all that the eastern part of the province has to offer.

# The Canadian Canoe Museum in Peterborough

Where: New location at 2077 Ashburnham Drive, 5 minutes from Highway 7 in downtown Peterborough [Telephone 705-748-9153]

Unfortunately, you'll have to wait until late summer 2023 to visit the Canadian Canoe Museum, which is currently moving to a bigger and better location. They will reopen right on the waterfront in downtown Peterborough, which is a great spot to see not only the museum but the town itself. The Canadian Canoe Museum explores Canadian heritage and history through the unique lens of the canoe and other watercraft, which provides rich context to some of your favourite boating and paddling adventures. The museum boasts

over 100 canoes, lots of Indigenous history, interactive galleries, a scavenger hunt, and puppet shows for kids.

## Indian River Reptile and Dinosaur Park in Indian River

Where: Highway 7 and Regional Road 38 Indian River Reptile Zoo and Dinosaur Park is a zoo and museum specializing in all things Jurassic. They have some great interactive galleries that the kids will love. You can walk or drive through the exhibits, which are mostly outdoors, but inside, they have a reptile zoo that doubles as a not-for-profit sanctuary for abandoned reptiles and other animals. All proceeds from ticket sales go toward the sanctuary.

### **Jack's Family Restaurant in Norwood**

Where: Off of Highway 7 in downtown Norwood

Jack's Family Restaurant in downtown Norwood offers tasty bites and wholesome homemade meals for affordable prices. It's rumoured to have some of the best fish and chips in eastern Ontario, and other famous seafood options include fish tacos, clam chowder, and shrimp and chips. They also have burgers, poutine, ribs, and even fancier options, such as braised lamb shanks and liver and onions.

#### Iron Rooster Rotisserie and Grill in Marmora

Where: Highway 7 and Yarrow Lane, Equidistance between Marmora and Madoc

The Iron Rooster is a motorcycle-themed rotisserie and grill located on Highway 7 between Marmora and Madoc. It's known by locals for its delicious chicken wings, which their website claims are the best around town. But they also offer other delicious assortments of barbecue classics, such as chicken, beef burgers, and more than a dozen appetizers.

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Marmora Farmers Market Saturdays
