
There are many benefits of short-term accommodations within communities like Marmora and Lake. These are most evident when hosts ensure that they are good neighbours. Please consider some tips on

Let surrounding homes know that you own a short-term rental and give them a way to reach you in an emergency. Neighbours can be the best way to get an early warning if something goes wrong on your property.

Make sure you know the related bylaws (listed above) and understand that you, as the owner, are responsible for your property at all times. Guests are more likely to follow the rules if you make them clear from the start. Their behaviour is your responsibility - make sure they know what is expected of them by you and the community.

Monitor Your Property: Preventing loud parties is an essential part of keeping the community safe and peaceful for your neighbours. Do not alienate your neighbours, who can be helpful in looking out for your property, by being oblivious to the way your guests behave.

CLWA 85 Years Old

From the Marmora Herald, the Marmora Historical Foundation and Anne MacNeill

CROW LAKE ASSOCIATION FORMED Aug. 22, 1940

An enthusiastic meeting of the property owners on Crow Lake was held at Marble Point Lodge on Sunday, August 18 at 3 P.M. On the Saturday previous the notice had been circulated around the lake outlining the various aims and purposes of the organization. These were heartily endorsed and the following were elected to act for those present:

- President - Mr. C. H. Buskard
- Secretary- Mr. W. C. Dymond
- Committee - Mr. C. H. Buskard, W. C. Dymond, John Warren, L. Bonter and D. Marett.

The committee has been instructed to meet the Township Council at an early date to discuss the points raised in the circular and other matters of interest. As those present were all from the north half of the east shore, the activities for the moment will be centered on this section. If the other section of the lake should show any interest in this organization, the privilege will be widened to take care of the whole lake.

Health Unit Merger

Our local health unit just got a whole lot bigger.

As of January 1, Hastings Prince Edward Public Health (HPEPH) has officially merged with two other eastern Ontario health units to become part of the newly formed South East Health Unit. This comes after the boards of three separate health units voted unanimously to merge in early December.

On Wednesday, the recently merged Board of Health met for the first time, officially launching the new public health agency made up of Hastings Prince Edward Public Health (HPEPH); Kingston, Frontenac and Lennox & Addington Public Health (KFLA); and the Leeds, Grenville and Lanark (LGL) District Health Unit. The new health unit will cover nearly 20,000 square kilometres, and serve more than 550,000 residents. The Ministry of Health says they will provide funding for the first three years of the transition process.

“A merger of our three agencies will strengthen capacity and local public health programs and services, resulting in overall healthier communities across the southeast region,” said HPEPH Board Chair Jan O’Neill, after the merger vote in December. O’Neil is the mayor of Marmora and Lakes Township. This week she was also voted in as board chair for the newly merged South East Health Unit.

In a news release, the health unit noted that the new governance structure will “ensure that the entire southeast region has the benefit of four experts guiding public health issues locally, while still ensuring that each geographic area retains local leadership during the transition to a larger agency.”

They added that collaboration with local partners will continue as each office works with their communities to “ensure a smooth transition

to a merged entity and to maintain appropriate services and supports across the southeast region.”

Office addresses, phone numbers, websites and social media accounts have not changed at this time. The public is asked to continue to interact with their local public health office as they usually would until otherwise directed. Safety Tips For Lightning - The Weather Network

You often hear the phrase, 'when thunder roars, go indoors' when outside prior to a thunderstorm passing through. That is a safe way to ensure you don't get struck by lightning. If you can't get indoors right away, then avoid high ground, water, tall, isolated trees and metal objects such as fences or bleachers.

Even indoors, you have to take safety precautions in order to prevent receiving a electric shock from a lightning bolt.

- Stay away from windows.
- Unplug appliances.
- Do not use the telephone.
- Avoid running tap water.
- Get off the lake and out of the boat

5 Most Common Fines While Boating

You are out on your boat when you see another boat approaching. Suddenly the flashing lights go on and you realize you are being stopped by the police. We often see the police on the roads, but it is less common to be stopped in your boat. Still, if you're not following the boating safety regulations and don't have all your gear in line, the fines can add up fast.

So what do boaters most commonly get fined for? And, more importantly, how can you avoid getting ticketed? We contacted the Ontario Provincial Police and Sgt. Byron Newell of the East Region S.A.V.E. Team in Snowmobile, ATV, and Vessel Enforcement to find out.

Personal flotation devices (PFDs) and life jackets are the first thing that police officers are looking for. There needs to be a PFD for every person on board, they have to fit properly, show no wear or be missing fasteners. They have to be readily accessible (if you're not actually wearing yours) and if it's an inflatable life vest, users must be age 16 or older and you must be wearing it. The fine applies to every person on board who is not in compliance. Typically, the fine for not having the right life jacket is \$240 in Ontario.

Having open liquor or cannabis on board will attract another fine. You are allowed to transport these items, but they have to be sealed, stowed, and out of sight. An open container of either liquor or cannabis is not allowed on board a boat. (The only times when you can "consume" on your boat is when you are moored or anchored and you have a permanent washroom, cooking and sleeping accommodations onboard.) Also, remember,

people in kayaks, canoes, paddle boards, and other watercraft are covered under this regulation. The operator can be fined \$215 and everyone else onboard can also be charged \$125 per person.

Not having valid Pleasure Craft Operator's Card (PCOC) with them in the boat. The fine is \$305 for not having the card onboard (even if you have one at home). It's also best to have your other ID with you too. The PCOC card does not have a photo and the other ID can help establish that you are the person who holds that PCOC card. Fine: \$305.

No Spotter, A spotter is required when using your boat for "towed sports" (water skiing, wake boarding, wake surfing, tubing, etc.) and that spotter must be considered reliable or competent. The fine is \$305.

Powered vessels require a Pleasure Craft License and the Transport Canada vessel license numbers are to be properly displayed on the bow of the vessel. You are also required to have the registration—on board—and the vessel's ownership (or copies) too. Not having the license registration earns you a fine of \$305.

Astronomical Events 2025

Perseid meteor shower

(July 17 - Aug. 23, 2025) **(Peak - August 11,12)**

At its peak, you may see an average of 100 meteors per hour! The Perseids are “best viewed in the Northern Hemisphere during the pre-dawn hours, though at times it is possible to view meteors from this shower as early as 10 p.m.

Orionid Meteor Shower

(October 21-22)

Another meteor shower tied to Halley’s Comet, the Orionids will light up the sky with about 20 meteors per hour. The moon will be minimal, making this a great event for those seeking a crisp fall night under the stars.

Geminids Meteor Shower

(December 14)

While not as famous as its Persied cousin in August, the Geminids are a great sky show which astronomers estimate will have meteors fall at the rate of up to 120 per hour overnight on 13th to 14th, making this one of the most intense meteor showers of the year.

“Smiley Face” Triple Conjunction

A rare celestial event where Venus, Saturn, and the crescent moon align, resembling a triangular pattern on **April 25**.

Rain for 1 Million Years?



If you think it's rainy now, try living through the Carnian Pluvial Episode. Taking place some 232 million years ago, during the Triassic Period, it was a time of intense rainfall that lasted between 1 million and 2 million years. The prolonged, world-altering event was first discovered by geologists in the 1970s and '80s. While studying ancient carbonate rocks in such far-flung locations as the Eastern Alps and the United Kingdom, they came across evidence of a deposit known as siliciclastic sedimentation that suggested unusually wet conditions. When it rains, it pours.

This period was preceded by an era of arid weather and coincided with the rise of the dinosaurs; the lush conditions that resulted helped the dinos thrive for another 150 million years or so. The Carnian Pluvial Episode wasn't without its downsides, however. It appears to have been triggered by a series of massive volcanic eruptions that led to acid rain and an influx in greenhouse gases, which eventually brought about rapid climate change and mass extinctions.

How to Quiet a Noisy Boat Engine

The guttural thrum of a boat engine may be a prelude to a thrill-packed day on the water, but it's not music to everyone's ears. Excessive boat noise is such an issue that Transport Canada is looking into the best ways to curtail it.

How do I know if my boat is too noisy?

If people have to raise their voices to be heard when your boat drives by at speed, it's probably too loud, according to Muskoka-based organization Safe Quiet Lakes. They recommend testing your boat's sound level by using a decibel meter—you can buy one online or download an app, such as NIOSH Sound Level Meter (iOS) or Decibel X Pro Sound Meter (iOS, Android). Make sure the decibel scale is set to A and the speed to slow.

Start by taking a reading from three feet behind the transom with the boat idling. The proposed limit for this stationary measurement is 88 dB (AS) (SAE J2005). Next, take a reading from shore. As the boat passes by (at any

distance), it should create less than 75 dB (AS) to meet the proposed standard (SAE J1970).

How can I make my boat quieter?

If you have an exhaust diverter system, keep it permanently disengaged and on quiet mode. If you have thru-hull exhaust, look into installing a muffler (\$500–\$1,500 per engine, not including installation). Gibson Performance makes an easy-to-install muffler (\$980), which the company claims will make your boat compliant with the 88 dB (AS) standard without compromising power. A third option is to redirect the engine exhaust through the propeller or below the waterline. Costs will vary depending on your existing engine and exhaust configuration.

Last year, Transport Canada launched a survey to determine what Canadians think the best option is to manage noise from pleasure craft engines. The most popular option was introducing performance standards with decibel limits for both operators and manufacturers. Among other reasons, it's the only plan that realistically addresses excessive engine noise emissions from both new and existing vessels.

Be Wake Aware

- Be aware of the size of your wake during displacement, transition & planing speeds

The Grand Canal of China

The Grand Canal is a vast waterway system in the north-eastern and central-eastern plains of China, running from Beijing in the north to Zhejiang province in the south. Constructed in sections from the 5th century BC onwards, it was conceived as a unified means of communication for the Empire for the first time in the 7th century AD (Sui dynasty). This led to a series of gigantic construction sites, creating the world's largest and most extensive civil engineering project prior to the Industrial Revolution. It formed the backbone of the Empire's inland communication system, transporting grain and strategic raw materials, and supplying rice to feed the population. By the 13th century it consisted of more than 2,000 km of artificial waterways, linking five of China's main river basins.

It has played an important role in ensuring the country's economic prosperity and stability and is still in use today as a major means of communication.

The Grand Canal represents the greatest masterpiece of hydraulic engineering in the history of mankind, because of its very ancient origins and its vast scale, along with its continuous development and its adaptation to circumstances down the ages. It provides tangible proof of human wisdom, determination and courage. It is an outstanding example of human creativity, demonstrating technical capabilities and a mastery of hydrology in a vast agricultural empire that stems directly from Ancient China.

The Grand Canal is the longest and oldest canal in the world.


